



CIVIC ENGAGEMENT PSA PROJECT: I CAN MAKE A DIFFERENCE

Essential Question: How is civic engagement

BIG IDEA

MAKE A PLAN

Every generation should strive to make the world better for the next. This project offers the opportunity for youth to take responsibility for their civic engagement. Youth will become engaged citizens who will take action to leave an aspect of their com-

munity better than it was before they acted. Participants will work collaboratively to assess community needs, research and evaluate local and global efforts to affect positive change, then develop a call to action in the form of a Public Service Announcement (PSA). Groups will create a PSA poster and script, which can be transformed into a PSA video. By understanding their civic responsibility and making a plan of action, they will develop tools to change the world. Connections to the community can be made by inviting parents, community members, or building staff to join the presentations. To help youth create digital portfolios to showcase their work, check out our guide to Digital Portfolio below.

PUBLIC SERVICE ANNOUNCEMENTS (PSAs)

Messages that benefit the public by raising awareness of an issue, influencing attitudes or actions for the good.



From Read to Lead to Lead to Feed!

Planning is Key to Program Success!



Planning Worksheet

Think about your overarching goal for the youth in your programs. Now turn that into one or two bite-sized, actionable goals that can be achieved through the PSA project. (e.g. Youth will confidently present their PSA in front of a group; Youth will develop an independent voice by choosing an issue that is meaningful to them; Youth will effectively collaborate and problem solve in small groups; Youth will develop research skills to better understand the issues addressed in their Public Service Announcement)	
How could youth present their PSAs? (e.g. A program-wide STEM Fair or Health Night and invite families to come in for a presentation, start a Facebook page, share on Instagram, or post to your organization's website to share out with the community)	
How many days a week will you use Read to Lead and for how long? (e.g. Twice per week for 1 hour)	
What is your access to technology? (e.g. One-to-one chromebooks daily, visit the computer lab once per week)
